NEIGHBORS COME TOGETHER TO RESCUE ABANDONED DOG

Many of you may remember seeing a scared black and white dog wandering throughout our neighborhood in mid-November. As we would learn later, this dog was rescued from Texas and placed for adoption by Bottle Babies Rescue. During a pop-up adoption event, the dog escaped from its new owners and found her way to Springwells Park. Scared, cold and hungry, the dog evaded concerned neighbors for almost 3 weeks. Neighbors left food and water but with cold nights and snow coming, something had to give. With the help of several concerned neighbors, Nicki Sheldon from Backyard Dog Heroes was contacted. Nicki is a one-woman dog rescue hero. Nicki drove from Wyandotte and set up a large dog cage and properly baited the cage. **It worked!**



With the dog safe, our neighbors, Jill and Calder Burgam, completed the rescue by adopting

the dog. As an homage to the Springwell Park neighbors who came together to rescue the dog, the Burgams named their new family member Parker. Parker is now living her best life with her new family, including her sister Abbie.

PROPERTY IMPROVEMENT

Property owners must receive approval from the Restrictions and Improvements Committee before beginning work on external property improvements, renovations or additions, to assure compliance with Springwells Park Subdivision Deed Restrictions. The permit approval process assures compliance with deed restrictions and is required regardless of whether a building permit is required by the city of Dearborn.

When a city permit is required, the Springwells Park permit must be granted prior to ap-plication for the City of Dearborn building permit. Springwells Park property owners are legally bound to comply with Springwells Park Subdivision Deed Restrictions.

Work must commence within 60 days of approval; beyond 60 days, an additional application is required.

Please complete the following application ONLINE and submit to Rick Sims, Chairperson of the Restrictions and Improvement Committee at 8 Adams Lane, along with the builder's or contractor's contract, pictures, sketches or blueprints and sample colors. EARLY VOTING

For the first time, Dearborn voters can vote early in person ahead of the Michigan Presidential Primary Election. Voters will continue to have the option to vote with an absentee ballot or in person at their designated polling place on Election Day, Tuesday, Feb. 27, 2024. However, effective this year, voters can instead vote early in person at the Ford Community and Performing Arts Center before Election Day. As is standard with all presidential primary elections in Michigan, voters must request a Republican, Democratic, or non-partisan ballot.

Early voting begins Feb. 17, 2024

Early voting will take place in the gymnasium of the Ford Community & Performing Arts Center beginning Saturday, Feb. 17, through Sunday, Feb. 25, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.
